**Best Looking Garden Award** – Last Chance to vote. You are the judges for the best-looking gardens. You have until Friday the 8<sup>th</sup> of September to get your nominations in. You can submit by simply dropping a note in the drop box or emailing back with your nominations. Choose up to three and place in order of your choices. If you drop a note off in the drop box, please put your name on it so we don't have duplicate voting. As we walk around Barrington, many of you have done an outstanding job in your gardens. We wish all of you could receive an award. It's really sad to think that the first frost is only a few weeks away and that our lovely flowers will start to get ready for winter. Enjoy the surrounding while the flowers are still brilliant.

<u>Garden Trash</u> – While just mentioning your beautiful gardens, a reminder that as fall comes and you ready those gardens for winter, please use your trash cans as much as possible for garden debris. However, if it can't fit in the can, simply place it by the curb and our crew pick it up. Of special note about gardens, those plants that have bulbs should be cut down to ground level and the leaves removed. In some cases, it is wise to separate and thin bulbs. Check out the internet for your particular bulb and it will tell you how keep them looking great.

**Fall Activity Around the Park** – As many of you know, Barrington Parks Fiscal Year begins on the 1<sup>st</sup> of October. What that means is the budget for the period 1 October 2017- 30 September 2018 will start 1 October and along with that will be projects that we hope to get done or at least started before the snow fly's. You will see us try to get a few more roofs on and maybe even some concrete work done. We will also see some required maintenance on the French drain system on the Back of Norwalk Road. It's all part of keeping our community running smoothly and in good repair. Again, our thanks to you homeowners who support tour community with your HOA fees. It would be impossible to keep it all going without you.

<u>**Rules Reminders**</u>– Trash Containers - Residents are to place containers on the street for collection <u>no earlier</u> than the evening before scheduled pickup, and are to remove the containers from the street <u>no later than the</u> <u>evening of pickup</u>. Trash containers must be kept in the garage or next to the fence for units with carports.

Driveways... Vehicle leaks are the responsibility of the homeowner to properly clean up. An oil drip pan must be used; this needs be kept clean and out of sight when the vehicle is not in the driveway.

<u>Parking on the Streets –</u> With concrete replacement possibly beginning in a month, parking on the street restrictions will be eased a bit. However, please use common sense in parking on the street. Don't park behind someone's driveway blocking them from getting in or out. Don't park in such a way as to restrict say a fire truck or ambulance from being able to get down the street. If you are one of the people having work done, we know it's inconvenient, but suggest that you park in the guest parking spots for a while.

<u>A Little Note About Security</u> - Good neighbors look out for each other. If you are away for a while and your neighbor knows about it, he or she can keep an eye on your place. Then, if they see anything out of the ordinary, they can alert the police. They might also let you know if you left your car unlocked or noticed other things that might help keep you and your property safe. Barrington Park has little reported crime. The ones we do hear about are usually those where a garage door was left open, or expensive valuable items were plainly visible in a car and the door unlocked. Help yourself and your neighbors from becoming victims. Watch out for yourself and others.

<u>Who Lives in Our Community?</u> – This was quite an interesting article that was published by Community Associations Institute. Having just completed our 2<sup>nd</sup> "Meet and Greet", and seeing the diverse people that belong to our community and Association, the article gives insight about how and why our neighbors may think and act so differently. Understanding and appreciating the generational values of your neighbors contributes to a strong community. Consider a few broad groups:

**Matures:** The Matures were born between 1920 and 1945. They're the last of the veterans of the World and Korean Wars, and are also called the "Silent Generation." They're about sacrifice. They survived the Great Depression, and they still reuse aluminum foil and paper bags. Their heroes were military figures. They believe that a rule is a rule. They feel that change is good, as long as it's the type of change they've envisioned. The Matures defined the world in which we live for many years, but they now have to give way to the Baby Boomers.

**Baby Boomers:** Baby Boomers were born between 1945 and 1964. Approximately 77 million in number, they're workaholics who believe in teamwork, democracy, and loyalty. They don't necessarily see the need to follow rules. Baby Boomers value the concept of "built to last." They invented the idea of "meaningful work," and the workplace continues to be a part of their self-identity. Baby Boomers will occupy the White House until approximately 2030.

**Generation X:** Generation X'ers were born between 1965 and 1977. Numbering about 44 million, this group was raised in an environment in which both parents worked. They question their parents' values, and they believe that jobs and housing are disposable. They place greater value on family and personal life than the Baby Boomers do, and they feel that a balanced life is more important than professional accomplishments.

**Generation Y:** Generation Y's were born between 1977 and 2000. They comprise approximately 33 percent of the U.S. population, and projections suggested that by the year 2010, those age 33 and younger will number 137 million, or 46 percent of the U.S. population. People in this group have always known the Internet, laptops, and cell phones. It would never occur to them to physically touch a television to change the channel. People born in the U.S. after 1983 have always had a President from the Southern states. South Africa's official policy of apartheid has not existed in their lifetime, cars have always had CD players and air bags, weather reports have always been available 24 hours a day, and genetic testing and DNA screening have always been available. This generation focuses on its individual choices, goals, and the future.

All these different types of people living and working together is what makes Barrington Park such a great place to live.
